But I know that without God in my life I would not be here to tell my story."

K.I.S.S. = Keep It Simple Sister "Starting a Prayer Group" By Rose Laugerman

Starting a prayer group can be as simple as two or three women getting together to pray in the name of Jesus. - *Matthew 18:19-20 "For where two or three gather in my name, there am I with them."*

One of the first prayer groups I was part of began very simply with two friends who had a heart for the lost in their families and in the community. The three of us had no theological training nor did we know how to pray beautifully poetic prayers. We simply wanted to come before our Lord and Savior and give him thanks, praise him, and ask him to answer our prayers. - John 14:14 "You may ask me for anything in my name, and I will do it."

It is important to keep the focus on prayer and not on anything else. Make it very clear that you are getting together precisely to pray. It is essential that gossip is not part of the prayer group. Requests for prayer and anything shared in the group must be kept confidential.

Keep the prayer group informal. Make sure everyone feels comfortable and free to pray out loud or silently. God hears all our prayers whether they are spoken or unspoken.

One of my prayer groups prays Bible verses. For example: *The wrath of God is being revealed from heaven against all the godlessness and wickedness of people, who suppress the truth by their wickedness, since what may be known about God is plain to them, because God has made it plain to them." – Romans 1:18-19*


The verse could be a prayer like this for the lost: "I pray that _____ would see and understand the wrath of God against ungodliness and unrighteousness of men who suppress the truth, and that he would cry out for mercy. May what is known about God be plain to _____ as you show yourself to him."

A "prayer list" that you can refer to and praise God as you see answers to prayers helps to. Someone shared with me that I was on her prayer list before I became a believer. I thank God each day for those prayers that led to my salvation. However you decide to pray, it is important to remember that God is always waiting with open arms to hear us and answer our prayers.
